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I. WELCOME TO OUR COMMUNITY

Welcome to the Briggs Lake Chain of Lakes. We hope you enjoy being a part of our community and share in our love of the water and pleasures that lake living in Minnesota provides. This booklet contains useful information about our lake association, community resources, customs, and history.

BRIGGS LAKE CHAIN ASSOCIATION (BLCA)

The BLCA's mission is to "promote the care, improvement and general welfare of the Briggs Lake Chain (Julia, Briggs, Rush, and Big Elk) and adjoining and connecting waterways.

BLCA membership is made up of property owners on and around the four lakes. Two general meetings are held each year on the second Friday of June at Palmer Park with a BBQ and the second Saturday of August at Palmer Town Hall. Membership drives are an annual event.

Our association is governed by an enthusiastic and hard-working all-volunteer Board of Directors composed of four officers and fifteen representatives elected from the membership. We have many active committees doing conservation projects, community events, and fundraisers.

The BLCA relies on its community for funding. Those that choose to become members and those who donate to our specific projects (aquatic invasive species (AIS) control, July 4th Fireworks Display, Fish stocking, etc.) fund the organization. The BLCA is designated a 501C3 organization so all donations are tax deductible.

Our goal is to improve the water quality and habitat of the lakes and adjoining waterways, as well as striving to keep our neighborhoods safe and secure.

Our website, www.briggslakechainassociation.com, contains information for members and residents, with links to related agencies and associations. We publish "THE LAKE REPORT" newsletter monthly and annually compile and distribute the Palmer Community Directory to residents.

BLCA has a program (paid for by area residents, fundraising activities and a grant from the DNR) to control two invasive weeds – Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) and Curlyleaf Pondweed (CLP). Please see our section on invasive species for more information.

Due to a rise in the expenses and the lack of grant funding, residents petitioned the formation of the 3 Lake Improvement District (TLID). (see page 9)

BLCA is a member of the Minnesota Lakes Association and was selected as the Minnesota Lake Association of the year in 2006 and outstanding Conservation Cooperator in 2014.

HEALTHY LAKES COMMITTEE

This committee does the heavy lifting for the BLCA and our lakes. It meets year-round at the Palmer Township Hall on the first Thursday of the month at 6:30 pm. The committee chair(s) reports monthly to the BLCA board and updates the board of the Healthy Lakes Committee's activities and can act on recommendations from the committee. One does not have to be a board member to belong to this committee.

HISTORY OF OUR LAKES

The four lakes are spring fed but also receive inflow from several other sources. Since 1932 there has been a dam in place at the south end of Rush Lake that helps regulate the water level in the upper three lakes. The BLCA and volunteers maintain the dam.

Channels connecting Julia, Briggs, and Rush allow access to all three lakes. Briggs Creek, which flows into Briggs Lake is the major source of water coming into the upper three lakes.

During periods of high water (High Water Events) the Elk River overflows into Briggs Lake via Briggs Bayou. Lily Creek connects Rush to Elk but the water control dam at the outlet of rush prevents traffic to and from Elk. The Elk River flows into and out of Elk Lake and eventually flows into the Mississippi River at the City of Elk River.

Residents may sign up with the BLCA for e-mail notifications of High-Water Events to be alerted to rising water conditions, so they are made aware of when "<u>slow-no-wake ordinances</u>" for watercraft go into effect and when it is lifted.

Our lakes have an overabundance of nutrients, especially phosphorus, and frequently experience algae blooms during the summer months. The BLCA has studied and continues to study on-site run off. Lakeside properties are part of the problem, and we are working at educating residents on how to lessen their additions to the pollution in the lakes and help them finance native conservation plant projects. Contact a BLCA Board Member listed on page 15 to arrange for a complimentary analysis of your property and to be eligible for grant money and/or free native plants to enhance native growth and filter run-off into our lakes.

The bottom surface of the lakes is primarily hard sand, with some layering of silt and sediment. There are shoals and sandbars (especially on Briggs, the channel between Briggs and Rush, and at the Elk River outlet area of Elk) where it is easy to damage propellers. Buoys mark many of the worst areas but ask your neighbors and use caution until you become familiar with our lakes. Lower water levels in July and August increase this problem and can make launching and docking boats difficult.

All four lakes have public boat access landings. They are located at the north end of Julia, the south end of Briggs, the south end of Rush, and the east side of Elk. A canoe/carry-in access is located on the west side of Briggs. Volunteers are needed to monitor boat landings and both the BLCA and Healthy Lakes are continually working to get maintenance plans in place. Volunteers are preferable to the expense of paid monitors.

To help control trash and improve the environmental quality of the accesses, the Palmer Township pays for refuse containers at Briggs Lake and Lake Julia landings and provides portable toilets at Briggs, Julia and Rush lake accesses. Clear Lake Township provides the portable toilet at the Elk Lake access.

LIFE-STYLES

Much of the lifestyle around the lakes is geared to casual living. Traditionally, our community is friendly, outgoing, welcoming and a pleasant place to live. Since many of our lake homes are located on relatively small lots, common sense suggests that controlling noise and volume levels of music, and showing courtesy when boating, will help build and preserve a friendly community spirit.

LAKE INFORMATION AND MAPS

PALMER COMMUNITY DIRECTORY

Each year the BLCA compiles and publishes a community directory covering all of Palmer Township and the part of Clear Lake Township that is around Elk Lake. The proceeds from directory ads go towards funding BLCA projects. <u>New residents are encouraged to provide the BLCA Membership chair with their name and other contact information</u>. The membership chair is listed on page 15. The Directory is distributed to all residences surrounding the lake free of charge. If you don't receive a copy, pick one up at the Briggs Lake General Store, Palmer House Bar & Grill, at a BLCA monthly meeting, at Palmer Townhall or request a copy from your local lake representative. Your lake representative(s) are listed on page 15.

SHOPPING AREAS

The closest location for convenience food, hardware, gas, food and liquor is in Palmer. Other stores are located in Becker, Clear Lake, Clearwater, Foley, Monticello, and St. Cloud.

PARKS

Palmer Park is a public park operated by Palmer Township and located south of Palmer Town Hall on County Road 6. There is a playground, an enclosed pavilion, a building with kitchen facilities, toilets, pickle ball/tennis courts, a baseball diamond, horseshoe pits, a basketball court, a blacktop parking lot, and an open playing area. Both the Town Hall and the Park Pavilion can be rented for personal use. For more information, contact the township clerk listed on page 16.

PROPERTY ADDRESS NUMBERS

Every residential property in Palmer and Clear Lake Townships is identified with a street address marker located at the roadside. these signs are uniform in size, reflective color (which is different for each township), height, and distance from the roadway.

* <u>Because these signs are so important to identify our property in case of emergency, please do not remove</u> <u>or relocate them and keep brush trimmed away. They are also helpful for visitors searching for an address,</u> <u>particularly at night and to emergency personnel when necessary.</u> <u>PLEASE keep your mailbox area clear of weeds and debris and empty and clean them on a regular basis.</u>

Also lets all work at keeping our lots and shorelines looking beautiful so we all can enjoy the views as we float by on our boats, kayaks, canoes and pontoons.

II. Environment

Fishing

Our lakes provide good fishing for pan fish, bass, pike, and walleye. From time to time the DNR surveys our lakes for game fish population and stocks the lake. For further information, visit the DNR site at www.dnr.state.mn.us.

LAWN CARE

It is illegal to use fertilizers containing phosphorus on established lawns, even though it is still legal to sell these products. It is best not to use fertilizer on your lawn, to avoid run-off to the lake. <u>Consider using lake</u> <u>water for lawn irrigation and utilize the natural nutrients present in the lake water.</u> <u>There is an abundance</u> <u>of phosphorus in the lake water. On your lawn, it will grow grass rather than be available for algae.</u> If you choose to use commercial fertilizer, <u>ensure that it is phosphorus-free.</u>

Nobody likes weeds or insects, especially mosquitoes, but if herbicides and insecticides are used extensively, they also will eventually seep into the ground and well water supply.

Our sandy soil and tree cover make growing grass a challenge. If you seed, try using a grass seed mix of 50% creeping red fescue, 25% Kentucky Bluegrass, and 25% perennial rye.

The DNR, along with the BLCA, encourages shore land planting with native plants to create a buffer strip of wild, un-mowed grasses along the lakeshore portion of your property to serve as a filter to slow run-off and to reduce transfer of chemicals into the lake water. Watch our website and Facebook page for BLCA sponsored programs that include how to get a DNR grant to subsidize a lake front restoration project, including **FREE** native plants.

Please make every effort <u>NOT</u> to blow your grass clippings or leaves into the lake because this only adds further nutrients for algae growth. There are local companies listed in the community directory for lawn care needs.

TREE PRUNING

Oak trees are the most abundant tree and occasionally need pruning. Beware of how and when you trim because Sherburne County is infested with Oak Wilt that is fatal to Oak trees. The disease spreads through roots or by insect carriers from infected trees over a mile away. See <u>www.briggslakechainassociation.com</u> for more information. The highest danger season for spreading Oak Wilt is April, May, and June. Google Oak Wilt for more information. If you are contemplating cutting down a tree you must check with the zoning department.

COMPOST SITES

Compost sites are available at Becker, Big Lake, Elk River and Zimmerman. The Becker site is closest and open 24/7. An access card is required and available at no cost at the Becker City Hall. The address is 12060 Sherburne Avenue. The phone is 763-200-4239.

LEAF AND BRUSH BURNING

Burning of leaves, limbs, and brush is permitted. A burning permit is required prior to any fires. Permits are available free of charge and may be obtained at McDonald's Meats in Clear Lake. Permits may be issued in other areas, but your local address must be on the permit.

The permits cover a defined period and generally allow burning only between 6 pm and 6 am. In dry weather permits may be restricted until conditions for burning are more favorable. The DNR enforces burning rules-penalties can be costly.

To protect our lakes from the drainage of dissolved ashes, burning sites should be at least 200 feet from the lakeshore, or the ashes should be gathered and transferred to a remote location. Also, don't burn leaves in ditches, and we discourage any burning on the shore as the water run-off can carry the ash residue into the watershed which is bad for the lakes.

Recreational fires do not require a permit if located in an established fire pit. We discourage any burning on the shore as the run-off carries the ash residue into the watershed.

SEPTIC SYSTEM GUIDELINES

Septic disposal systems must be designed to meet code requirements and properly maintained to prevent contamination of ground water and our lakes. Any repair or replacement of existing systems, other than periodic pumping, requires obtaining a permit from the Sherburne County Zoning office. The county website, <u>www.co.sherburne.mn.us</u>, has more information and sources for assistance.

The University of Minnesota Extension Service conducts seminars on septic systems and has prepared a booklet describing proper construction and maintenance of on-site sewage disposal systems available from Sherburne County Zoning or from the U of M. Look at <u>www.extension.umn.edu</u>. or <u>http://septic.umn.edu</u>.

BUILDING PERMITS

Permits are needed for the following:

- Any alterations to your property or buildings. (Sherburne County Zoning Office)
- Any additions to your property or buildings. (Sherburne County Zoning Office)
- Burning of bushes, leaves and brush. (Permits obtained at McDonalds meats in Clear Lake)

In the past, projects often were done without permits, a fine issued and paid after the fact. County officials are now less lenient about violations and may even require demolition and removal of unapproved structures in addition to a fine. <u>Always</u> contact the Sherburne County Zoning Department to determine if a project requires a Shoreline Alteration permit prior to commencing any work.

SHORELAND ORDINANCES

In addition to county zoning ordinances, all lake properties are subject to State of MN shoreland ordinances. These govern placement of structures on building sites, septic systems, boathouses, shoreline alteration, cutting of trees, retention of bluff areas and recreational use of water surfaces. A copy of the ordinance is available from Sherburne County Zoning office or the DNR.

WATER WELLS AND TESTING

Most residences have individual water wells for drinking and other uses. To ensure a safe water supply, regulations must be followed in locating or maintaining a private well.

Generally, any drilling of wells (new or replacement) requires a permit from, and inspection by, the Minnesota Department of Health. Wells which are abandoned require filling and capping by a licensed well drilling company. Contact the Minnesota Department of Health if you are planning a new or replacement well on your property.

The Sherburne County Public Health Department periodically sponsors a program to test nitrate levels in well water. For more complete testing, you may purchase a water testing kit from the Sherburne County Zoning office for a small fee.

WATER WEEDS/AQUATIC VEGETATION

Native weeds are desirable and beneficial to our lakes. They provide habitat for fish and generate the oxygen necessary for the fish population. It is unlawful to cut or remove native weeds from any of our lakes without first obtaining a permit from the DNR.

Non-native invasive weeds (AIS) are not beneficial and can seriously damage the fish population and the water quality of our lakes. In 2014, Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) was detected in Rush Lake. There are high concentrations of Curly-leaf Pondweed on Briggs, Rush and Julia. So far Elk hasn't had problems with these non-native invasive weeds. Left uncontrolled these AIS can spread across entire lakes reducing the fish population, damaging watercraft, etc.

Each year residents of Briggs, Rush and Julia are asked to contribute financially to a special fund to support the AIS herbicide spraying. The BLCA hires surveyors to locate infestation sites and determine concentration of plants. The BLCA then obtains the DNR permit and retains a commercial contractor for the treatment. The BLCA manages the treatment of offshore AIS (no closer to shore than 150 feet).

Property owners can control nuisance native weeds and AIS near shore (within 150 feet from shore). Both nearshore and offshore treatments require permits that must be applied and paid for before the end of February each year. The DNR limits the total amount and type of chemicals used in lakes so they need to know how much near shore treatment there will be before granting the BLCA a permit to treat the offshore AIS. The BLCA coordinates this activity through **PLM Lake Management** who sends out their lake management packet to all lakeshore property owners, sent each November/December. Thus, we can ensure maximum effectiveness of management programs at a greatly reduced cost for all participants.

The BLCA is very concerned about preventing the spread of AIS, including zebra mussels, another aquatic invasive species that is spreading in Minnesota lakes. AIS is easily transmitted on trailers, boats and in live wells. Lake residents are known to have spread AIS by not properly sanitizing used docks, rafts, swimming platforms, boats, etc. that they purchased in infected areas before they put them in the water at their own lake. The state law requires that all craft entering or leaving the lakes be checked and cleaned of weed residue. Please check your trailers and boats and acquisitions carefully. (see: Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers at <u>www.dnr.state.mn,us</u> and on signage at all boat accesses.)

Residents who live on Rush, Julia, and Briggs Lakes are members of the three lake LID (Lake Improvement District). This group monitors and pays for expenses related to the invasive species that are present in these three lakes, such as testing, surveying and removal.

Earth Day

In the spring, Palmer and Clear Lake Townships each sponsor a major community cleanup effort. This provides property owners an opportunity to dispose of junk, debris, appliances, tires, scrap iron, batteries, and other items. Watch the township websites and BLCA Facebook page for details.

RUNOFF ANALYSIS (Lake Steward program)

The BLCA provides owners with an opportunity to evaluate their property for issues affecting water quality of our lakes. There is no obligation to do anything to your property, but it is a great chance to learn about issues affecting our lakes and how you might be able to help. It is interesting, fun, and doesn't take long. You will also become aware of grants and funding that help finance projects that help water quality.

<u>T-LID</u>

The TLID (3 Lake Improvement District) manages the control of Invasive Species like Curly-leaf Pondweed and Eurasian Water Milfoil. A project undertaken in 2018 to study these requires an ongoing expense which is managed by the TLID. The TLID assesses the expenses for major projects and the cost is shared equally by lakeshore property owners. We hire DNR water guards to monitor the boat landings at all three lakes. Volunteers are needed for this project to lower costs. If you would be willing to monitor this, please contact the BLCA board.

Rubbish Pick Up

Garbage may not legally be burned, buried, or allowed to stand. Each resident is responsible for his or her own rubbish pickup. Several rubbish hauling contractors serve our community. See your phone directory or newspaper for phone numbers and information. Waste Management services our community.

Recycling Program

Recycling many materials instead of throwing them in the garbage is good for our environment. See the Environmental Educator for recyclers in our area along with a list of materials accepted and days and hours of operation. As an option, many of the rubbish haulers also provide recycling pickup service.

III. EDUCATION

Libraries

There are public libraries in St. Cloud, Becker, and Clearwater. See your phone directory for more information. There is also a lending library at the Palmer Township Hall.

School Districts and Bus Transportation

There are 2 school districts serving our area. Becker District 763 and St. Cloud District 742. Please call the district office for enrollment details.

BLCA SPONSORED PROGRAMS AND EVENTS

In addition to our monthly BLCA meetings and June and August general meetings, our lake association also sponsors many programs and events. Activities include:

IV. GOVERNMENT

Your lake property is located in Sherburne County and the county offices are located on the west edge of Elk River on Highway 10. The toll free 800 numbers are listed at the back of this booklet. The county website is <u>www.co.sherburne.mn.us</u>.

Briggs, Julia, Rush and the northeast ½ of Elk Lake are located in Palmer Township. Elk Lake is in Clear Lake Township. Each township has a board that meets monthly. Palmer Township meetings are held the 2nd Monday of each month at 7 pm at the Palmer Town hall and the Clear Lake Township meeting is held the 3rd Tuesday of each month at the Clear Lake Town hall. Both meetings are open to the public.

DOG ORDINANCES AND CONTROLS

Both townships have leash laws. Please check with your town clerk for a copy of the ordinance covering your area.

SLOW-NO WAKE ORDINANCES / HIGH WATER EVENTS

There are ordinances in effect in both townships to protect our shorelines and reduce pollution when the water levels are high. <u>Misdemeanor fines for exceeding 5 mph are in effect.</u> Signs are posted at all lake accesses and notices are sent by email if we have your email address.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE

Because roadways are narrow in the winter they must be kept open for school buses and emergency vehicles. Vehicles blocking roadways or parked for long periods on the road may be fined or towed.

VII. ORGANIZATIONS

Fraternal and Service Clubs

Lions, Lioness, Rotary, American Legion & Auxillary, Elks, Eagles, etc. are located in St. Cloud and the surrounding areas. There are also gardening groups, quilting guilds, and sportsman clubs available. Many organizations offer programs for seniors. Becker Community Center and The Whitney Senior Center are two. See local newspapers and phone directories for others and contact information.

VIII. RECREATION

Golf courses are located within easy driving distances. Please see your local directories for locations.

Health Clubs and Rec Centers are in St, Cloud, Becker, and Monticello. Annual and day passes are available. See your local directories for locations.

Boats, ATV's, and snowmobiles are all licensed by the Minnesota DNR. Their website is <u>www.dnr.state.mn.us</u>. Our area has snowmobile and ATV trails. Maps are available at Palmer House Bar & Grill and Jack and Jim's. ATV's may not be ridden in ditches in our area from April 1 to August 1.

Fishing and Hunting licenses and copies of current Minnesota Regulations can be obtained through the DNR or at Briggs Lake General Store.

Palmer Park has groomed cross-country ski trails. Find more trails at county and city parks in Becker, Clearwater, and St. Cloud.

Shooting ranges and gun clubs for recreational shooting ranges are in Palmer and St. Cloud. Two of them are Wild Marsh in Palmer or Del-Tone in St. Cloud. Discharge of firearms in populated areas is illegal.

IX. SAFETY AND SECURITY

In an emergency call 911. In Sherburne County 911 is the point of contact for police, fire, medical and other emergencies. For non-emergencies, information or questions the number is 763-765-3500 or 1-800-433-5245.

Sheriff and Police

Sherburne County Sheriff is located in Elk River. Our roads are routinely patrolled, and response is quick. They also have an office in Palmer Town Hall.

Home Security

We have neighborhood watch on all the lakes. We also suggest you exercise protective caution. Alert neighbors if you will be gone and leave contact numbers with them in case of emergencies.

<u>Fire</u>

Palmer Township Fire Department is located next to Palmer Town Hall. Use the 911 number and give clear and concise address and directions.

Tornadoes and severe weather

In the event of severe weather warnings are broadcast on local radio and tv stations. Warning sirens will be sounded.

Nuclear Emergency

There is a nuclear power generating plant in Monticello. An emergency planning guide has been developed and distributed to households that may be affected in the rare event of a nuclear emergency. A copy may be obtained from the power plant.

X. SERVICES

Snow removal and plowing varies by type of road. Questions or concerns please contact the respective township.

Driveway snow removal is up to the individual. <u>It is illegal to deposit driveway snow on township roads, right</u> of ways, ditches or pushing snow across the roadway for removal purposes.

Post Office

The local post office is located at 8698 Main Avenue in Clear Lake. Hours are posted on the door and their number is 320-743-2505.

Mail will be delivered only to an approved mailbox located on the roadside.

Additional post offices are located in Becker, Clearwater, and inside Coborn's grocery store in Clearwater.

XI. TRANSPORTATION

<u>Airports</u>

In addition to Minneapolis/St. Paul there is an airline service located in St. Cloud. Their number is 320-253-1500. A private airport on County Road 55 east of Highway 10 provides facilities for private planes and offer flight instruction.

North Star Commuter Rail

This service to and from the Twin Cities is available from Big Lake. Bus service to connect to this commuter rail is available from St. Cloud and Becker. Information is available at https://www.metrotransit.org/northstar.

St Cloud Metro Bus Terminal also has complete schedule information at 320-251-7433.

Bus/Van Service

Gas Service/LP gas

Home delivery of LP gas is available in our area and several stores fill cylinders and tanks. See your community directory.

Natural Gas
